The Lease is finally signed

It seems to have taken forever, but the 21-year lease for the Southern Highlands Botanic Gardens site was finally signed in the last week of May. It has taken 2½ years from the time the first lease negotiations began with Council. Overall there have been seventeen years of negotiations—with Council and the community—and finally it all came to a satisfactory conclusion.

Planting Trees on 2 June 2015

To celebrate the signing of the lease, Mayor Duncan Gair planted a *Pistacia chinensis* (Chinese Pistachio). This beautiful tree, which will grow to about 8m (25ft), has brilliant yellow, orange and scarlet foliage in autumn. It's planted just inside the current main entry.

Under the deep blue wintry sky, the celebratory tree planting took place—down in the Woodland section, Sandy Alsop, a former member of the Galston Garden Club, planted a *Quercus ilex* (evergreen oak), donated by the GGC.

Another five trees were planted down in the woodland—a circle of *Quercus robur* 'Fastigiata' (the upright English oak)—as its name indicates it is a columnar form of English Oak. The fastigiata oak was originally propagated from an upright tree first discovered growing wild in a forest in Germany and was propagated by grafting in 1783—so should it really be called a German oak?

These deciduous trees will eventually mature into a dense elongated oval shape with short trunks, growing to about 13m high with a 4m canopy. The circle will be a lovely feature in the Gardens and is a result of one of our members' 70th birthday. Instead of presents, her guests contributed money to purchase trees for SHBG.

One of our supporters also planted a commemorative tree to celebrate her wedding. As you can imagine, the June working bee was literally a hive of activity with all the planting, the potting of lots of roses and other specimens for later sales. The Marulen Garden Club came for a visit and enjoyed their buying spree. Judy Keast, Di Grant and their friends provided a sumptuous morning tea.

Wingecarribee Shire Council recently presented SHBG Inc with an award for best Heritage Tourism project for 2014 for the 'Oldbury Experience', part of our Autumn Open Garden Weekend 2014. The gardens of three historic properties were open—*Oldbury Farm*, with its handsome sandstone homestead, was built in the 1820s and is one of the oldest properties in the area; *Oldbury Vale*, a new 2006 house designed by Richard Rowe replacing a 1950s weatherboard cottage, with a redesigned country garden surrounding; and *Oldbury Cottage*, a renovated sandstone shepherd's hut with a new addition by Richard Rowe surrounded by a new garden established in 2005. The three gardens delighted all the visitors.

Many grateful thanks are due to David and Jane Newby for allowing the Oldbury gardens to be open for our Botanic Gardens major fundraising event for 2014.

The Bird Fence

A fence has been erected to ensure that the public doesn't disturb the Latham snipe (*Gallinago hardwickii*) during their migratory period. The gates will be closed in that area from September to the end of March each year. Latham's snipe is a non-breeding visitor to SE Australia, and is a passage migrant through northern Australia to reach non-breeding areas located further south. They breed in Japan and far eastern Russia during the northern hemisphere summer.

Migrating south after the breeding season, they travel across Papua New Guinea to winter in eastern Australia. Internationally, Latham's snipe is considered to be a species of 'Least Concern', which means that the species is one which has been categorised by the International Union for Conservation of Nature as evaluated but not qualified for any other category. As such they do not qualify as threatened, near threatened, or (prior to 2001) conservation dependent.

The Latham snipe, of course, is not the only bird on the site and it is hoped that birdwatching (known as 'twitching') will be a highly popular activity in the Botanic Gardens—a wide number of bird species can be seen throughout the year.

The number of species is likely to increase as a result of the varied range of landscapes and environments that will be found in a relatively small area (from urban forest, wetlands, open plains, native and exotic plant species plantings). Neighbours have spotted at least eighty-five species on the site.

The new extension

You will have noticed the new extension to the pavilion (sometimes called 'the Shed'). The toilet block will enable us to invite school parties to visit the site. New pathways and a paved area are currently being designed to ensure easy access from the veranda to the Shade House. There are new gates erected at various points along the boundaries. Please remember that dogs are not permitted within the Gardens.

Personalised Pavers

Friends will be given the opportunity to purchase a personalised paver (\$50 each) for inclusion in the new paved area. There will be more details about this in the next *Operculum*.

The Main Building

The architect's competition for the main building is currently being planned. We are hoping that it will include a visitors' centre, restaurant, shop, areas for exhibitions and a library. Watch this space for further news about this exciting future development.

Would you like to help with winter and spring propagation?

The winter months allow you to evaluate your garden beds—have your perennial plants become too large and overcrowded and would they benefit from division? Some of the clumps will divide easily and there may be younger shoots ready to be removed from the outside of the clump. Other plants may require lifting and then tackled with a spade or sharp knife.

Immediately plant out the offcuts where you need them—but any excess plants remember the Botanic Gardens plant sales and pot them up into the best potting mix available and label. We will be very grateful to receive your offerings.

Bulbs

We always need bulbs to sell at the plant stalls. While you enjoy your bulbs this winter/spring, take note of areas where your bulbs are overcrowded. Mark the spot and after the foliage has completely died down you can lift them and donate them to us in a paper bag. Please clearly label the packets of bulbs.
