History of the Wisteria Arbour - Hilda Kirkhope Rock Garden

An arbour has graced the walkway from the Bull Paddock to the Tear Drop Driveway from at least the 1960's. Here pictured in 1965, it is nicely painted and seems to support a small Banksia Rose.

A Wisteria overtook the structure - here pictured just prior to terminal damage by storm in 2002. FOBG funded a replacement wooden structure which was completed in 2003.

In 2003, whilst The Hon. Sir Rupert Hamer was the Friends's Patron, and Kay Hirst the President of the Management Committee, a small brass plaque was created to commemorate FOBG support for garden projects. It was placed on the new wooden arbour. An opening ceremony was organised, with the Patron unveiling the plaque, followed by a basket lunch and garden tour on the day of the AGM in 2003. Funds that year were also used for new trees and plants (as recorded in the archives).

In 2021 this wooden Wisteria Arbour fell down under the weight of age, decrepitude and the huge wisteria. Garden manager Andrew Smith, in his retirement year (2022), and in the midst

of the pandemic, arranged for the removal, quotes, designs and rebuilding of the elegant metal structure by which the original (severely pruned) Wisteria is now supported. Once again the Friends supplied the funding for the second replacement of the arbour.
